

History of FPC: Part 1 - Local History

Our local history begins long before our congregation was established and is inextricably linked to the works of the Reverend Thomas C. Stuart. A graduate of the College of New Jersey (which would become Princeton University). Stuart was commissioned by the Synod of South Carolina as a missionary to the Indians in 1819. Initially rebuffed by the Creek nation, he continued westward and formed the Monroe Mission in 1821 where he ministered to the Chickasaw Nation. By 1823, he had established a school, a church, and housing near the Natchez Trace between Pontotoc and Cotton Gin Port (near modern day Amory). Following the signing of the Treaty of Pontotoc Creek in 1832, Stuart continued his work as the Chickasaw people prepared to journey westward. In recognition of his efforts, the Chickasaw granted him the title "Father" Stuart which he retained for the rest of his life. During this period "Father" Stuart founded the First Presbyterian Church of Pontotoc in 1835.

After the Chickasaw left the area in 1837-1838, "Father" Stuart ministered to the settlers, forming Zion Presbyterian Church in 1841. Painted a brilliant white, it became known as "White Zion" to differentiate it from the unpainted Baptist church nearby, which as the wood darkened with age, became known as "Black Zion." After his wife died in 1851, his daughter Mary Jane assisted with his mission. During the Civil War "Father" Stuart returned to Pontotoc to resume pastoral duties beginning in 1863. Following the War, "Father" Stuart, by then in declining health, moved to Tupelo to be with his daughter and her husband. A few months later, under the sponsorship of White Zion Church, he organized our very own First Presbyterian Church Tupelo in 1867 where he served as pastor until our first minister, Reverend James H. Gailliard could be called in 1868. Our Sesquicentennial book, The Light that Shines in Darkness, is an excellent resource detailing the history of the congregation.

What motivated "Father" Stuart to live such a remarkable life? Stay tuned as we explore the history of Presbyterianism each week!
