





As we approach the Kirkin' service, we will look at the various influences that would eventually lead "Father" Stuart to establish FPC.

John Knox

John Knox occupies a central spot in the history of the Presbyterian Church. As the founder of the Church of Scotland, of which we are an offshoot, it is difficult to overstate the influence of Knox on our polity and doctrines. Knox began his spiritual journey as an ordained Roman Catholic priest in 1536. It is not recorded just when Knox embraced the Protestant cause, but perhaps the most important influences were early Reformers Patrick Hamilton and George Wishart. Knox is known to have acted as Wishart's bodyguard in 1544, bearing a two-handed sword for the purpose. After Wishart's execution for heresy, Knox became a fugitive and eventually a galley slave from 1547-1549. After 19 months as a rower, he was released and fled to England where he was licensed to preach in the Church of England. Upon Mary Tudor's ascension to the throne, she restored Catholicism as the official religion forcing Knox to flee to Geneva where he was taken in by John Calvin. Having studied with Calvin, he returned to Scotland as a guiding light of the Reformation. In 1560, Knox and five other ministers wrote the Scots Confession in only four days! They would labor for months on the Book of Discipline which described the organization of the new Kirk. He would go on to become minister of St. Giles High Kirk in Edinburgh where, being an austere man, he would regularly preach against the excesses of the world, including those of Mary, Queen of Scots. Upon his death in 1572, he was buried in the churchyard of St. Giles (fun fact: when the church yard was paved, Knox was not moved; he rests beneath space #23 in the car park). Although it would take 120 years to become the national church, Knox is credited with establishing Presbyterian polity in the Church of Scotland, which would be exported to the Presbyterian Church in the American Colonies and form the basis of our polity today.
