





In Worship during the month of September, we will be focusing on the theme of *Follow Jesus*. For September 28, the mini-theme will be "Follow Jesus by Making Disciples" and our scripture passage will be from Mathew 28:16-20 and Matthew 3:13-17.

As we approach the Kirkin' service, we will look at the various influences that would eventually lead "Father" Stuart to establish FPC.

Hamilton, Wishart, et al. - Reformation Martyrs

Patrick Hamilton was the first martyr of the Scottish Reformation. In 1517, he was appointed Abbot of Fearn Abbey in Ross-shire. He studied at the University of Paris where he became a Master of Arts in 1520. It was there that he encountered the writings of Martin Luther. In 1523, he joined the faculty of the University of St. Andrews. Reformed doctrines deeply affected him, and by 1527, his teaching had attracted the attention of Archbishop James Beaton who had him tried and burned at the stake for heresy in 1528. Henry Forrest was a Benedictine Friar who was a determinant at St. Andrews in 1526. He "affirmed and said that Mr. Patrick Hamilton died a martyr, and that his articles were true." Forrest "underwent a long imprisonment in the sea tower" at St. Andrews and was eventually convicted of heresy and burned at the stake around 1532. His execution took place at the north stile of the church "that all people...might see the fire, and...be the more feared from falling into the like doctrine." George Wishart was a student at the University of Leuven, from which he graduated in 1531. While there, he translated the First Helvetic Confession from Latin to English. He taught New Testament at Montrose until investigated for heresy by the Bishop of Brechin in 1538. He fled to England where a similar charge was brought against him in Bristol. Fleeing to the Continent, he may have visited Germany and Switzerland in 1539-1540. He returned to teach and study at Corpus Christi College, Cambridge in 1542. He became an itinerant preacher in 1544, traveling Scotland from east to west accompanied by his disciple John Knox who acted as his bodyguard, bearing a twohanded sword to ensure that Wishart was allowed to preach. He went from place to place, in danger of his life, denouncing the Papacy and the abuses of the Church. In January of 1546, after telling Knox to flee and keep the Reformation alive, he was seized at Ormiston and transported to Edinburgh where a "show trial" was held that resulted in Wishart being hanged and burned in St. Andrews in March 1546. Walter Milne was the last Protestant martyr to be burned in Scotland before the Scottish Reformation changed the country from Catholic to Presbyterian. In his early years, he visited Germany where he learned the doctrines of the Reformation. During the time of Cardinal Beaton, he was denounced as a heretic, forced to flee the country, and condemned in absentia to be burned wherever he might be found. Long after the Cardinal's death, he was apprehended in the town of Dysart, Fife. After being confined in the castle at St. Andrews, he was brought for trial before an assembly of bishops, abbots, and doctors in the cathedral. Being over 80 years old, he was so weak and infirm that he had difficulty climbing into the pulpit to answer for his actions, but when he spoke, "he made the church to ring and sound with so great courage and stoutness that the Christians present were no less rejoiced than his adversaries were confounded and ashamed." He used the opportunity to point out what he regarded as the special errors of the church, and was condemned as a heretic and burned at the stake in April 1588 at the age of 82.
